Greetings all, I am John J. Hillyer III, and I was recently elected National Commander, NSVA, I have been a Life member of Navy Seabee Veterans of America and Island X-11 Tampa since 1982. Other SVA Positions, Commander Island X-11, Tampa; Commander, Dept. of Florida; and NSVA Southeast District Commander.

I have been a Cub Scout, Boy Scout and Explorer Scout and Junior Air Cadet. Played football, ran track and marched in the band at King High School, Tampa, FI. Graduated June of '62. I enlisted in the Naval Reserve Seabees, RMCB-14, Jan. 1962 while in high school, after graduation went to Great Lakes for recruit training, was Squad Leader. After that 2 weeks at Davisville, RI., for construction man training. Jan 1963, went on active duty, assigned to MCB-4, March '63, sent to Argentia, Newfoundland on an LSD. Upon returning to CONUS, made CMA3, I was assigned on a SEABEE Technical Assistance Team or "STAT Team" for training. Jan/Feb '64, the battalion went to Camp Lejeune, NC. for 6 wks., 2 wks. on the rifle range, 2wks at ITR, 2 wks. Courthouse Bay for Combat Demolitions Training. Next LST 1178, to Gitmo for 7 months, light equipment shop supervisor, returned to D-ville on an AKA, with the equipment party. Deployed to Rota, Spain, spring of '65, on an MSTS troop ship, worked in the mechanic shop, night shift, returned stateside on another Army troop ship. Another trip to Camp Lejeune, this time as the convoy mechanic, worked on our vehicles for 4 wks, late Oct. '65, I with 7 others were transfered to MCB-6, 1 Nov 65 on an LST to Gitmo, all kinds of military training. Jan. 1966, C -130 to Quonset Point, RI, snow on the ground, released from Active Duty.

Back to Florida, back in the reserves, progressed through the ranks, made Chief in 1974, Senior Chief, 1982, Masterchief 1988, numerous assignments, Platoon Commander, Weapons Platoon Commander, Equipment Officer, Heavy Shop supervisor, Equipment Maintenance Supervisor, Alpha and Charlie Company Chief, on deployment Alpha Company Commander twice, Charlie Company commander once. Was assigned as Command Senior/Master Chief for SELRES at Reserve Center, Tampa,1987-1992.

Officially Retired as EQCM Sep. 1993.PS, My Navy roots, Grandfather; on the USS Tacoma C-18, Cruiser 1907-1911, Father; joined Seabees 1942, assigned 64th NCB as CM2(Carpenters Mate Second Class, retired as BUC, Brother; Submarines, diesel Boats 1960's. GO Navy- Beat Army

Meet... Donatien (Don) M'Sadoques

He was born on March 19, 1921. He is from the Abenaki Tribe located in Odanak; a Native American Reservation in Canada. He and his twin brother, Lucien, were the second oldest children of a family of 10 kids. He grew up poor, yet and still, he was the child who was the caregiver in his family. He was the child who went with the priest from home to home to give the dying their last rites. He was the child who wove baskets for his mother. Baskets she would sell to help support the family. When he was 17, he left the reservation and worked in neighboring towns and, of course, sent most of his earnings home to help his family. He decided to migrate to the U.S. and settled in Connecticut. In 1942, when he was 21, he and his twin brother both enlisted into the United States Navy Seabees and served in the Pacific until 1945.

He married and lost his first wife (Jeanine) four short years later when his only child was just 2.5 years old. Sadly, his young wife died from complications due to Rheumatic Fever. After her death, he chose to raise his son with the help of his parents before he remarried at the age of 42. In the meantime, he was the spring board to the U.S. for most of his siblings and cared for both of his parents until their death. Eventually, he and his second wife, Esther, moved to Boynton Beach, FL where they lived together (40 years) until she fell ill with Myelodysplasia and succumbed to the disease over 15 years ago. As he did with his parents, he cared for her at their Boynton Beach home (where he still resides) until she died.

He is loved and respected by all who know him; especially the hundreds of residents of his community, Jamaica Bay. He was the man who would bring the community together with Friday night dinners, pancake breakfasts and community barbeques. He would "deliver" to those who were shut-in. He was the man who would check on folks who were hurt or came down with any kind of illness. He is a "giver" and took little.

Two years ago he fell seriously ill and that's where I come in. I am his Caregiver. I have cared for this gentle soul for nearly two years now. To be honest, when I stepped in, I didn't think I would be here two weeks...yet here I am; so blessed to be here spending the days with him.

During my time with him, I discovered how talented he is at knitting and crocheting. The blankets he made were incredibly beautiful, but the sweaters? The sweaters he made, with the most intricate designs, were beyond anything one could purchase at a high end store.

Due to his illness, he had all but stopped creating these beautiful things. Then one day I asked him to crochet something that I would be able to put a manger on for the holiday season. As I watched him crochet this beautiful red and white table cover (where the manger would be displayed), I saw a man with a "purpose." I realized how much joy this "purpose" brought to him. I tried to think of something he/we could do that would continue to bring "purpose" to his life and ...enter lap blankets.

Since February 2016, we (after a few online lessons for me!) began crocheting lap blankets and we thought it would be wonderful if we were to bring these blankets to the West Palm Beach VA Medical Center for the Vets living there.



This is Don after we completed 50 blanks. We now have over 120, so what you see in the picture is less than half of what we actually have.

When his community learned about our project, they came together and dropped off tons of yarn for us to continue on this mission. So once again, at 95.5 years of age, he is able to bring this community together for a common cause. He is, without a doubt, the kindest, gentlest, caring soul I have ever encountered. He is the ultimate humble servant! He served his family. He served his country. He served his community and his friends, and he did it well and faithfully. Imagine...at 95.5 his life is still about giving.

With the holiday season right around the corner, I hope, by sharing his story, we are all inspired by Don's life of giving and selflessness.

Thank you for allowing me to share the story of such a special human being.

The 2016 National Convention at Lake George, NY was one that was well attended and we voted in many new resolutions. I will briefly explain them. They will be included in the next By Law printing.

Article V Organization Section 3 Sub-section A Minimum of <u>3</u> members are need to organize a Navy SVAA Island (changed from 5 members)

Article V Organization/Departments Section 5 Sub-section Final Paragraph. Move the paragraph to Article VI Finances Section 8 (Misplaced paragraph)

Article VI Finance Section 9 NEW By-Law All past National Auxiliary Presidents, having successfully completed his/her term in office and having maintained good standing within the organization for an additional 6 years, shall be eligible for free life

membership in the Navy SVAA.

Article X Election and Duties Section 3 Subsection A NEW By-law No National Officer shall hold more than one elected office in the National NavySVAA at any one time.

Article X Section 3 Sub-Section B

Revision. Election of Officers shall be held every two years. All National Officers shall hold office for two years unless removed by resignation, death, or action by the National Executive Committee. (Reason—this is to prevent the continuous term of an officer in their elected position. If no opponent is presented, under the current bylaw the last elected National Officer remains in place.)

Article X Election and Duties Section 4 NEW By-law

Current Navy SVAA Officers who are active in any Navy NSVAA Island, Department, or Member at Large and are confirmed members in good standing shall be eligible for re-election by members present at the National Convention pursuant to Article IX section 4. (Currently no requirements for re-election to a National Office)

Article X Election and Duties Section 4 Sub-Section A NEW By-law The National Convention shall elect one (1) National President and one (1) National Vice President to serve no more than two (2) consecutive two (2) year terms. They shall not be eligible for reelection to their respective office for a period of 1 term (2) years. (Currently no term limits on elected National Officers.)

Article X Election and Duties Section 4 Sub-Section B NEW By-law The Nation Convention shall also elect one (1) National Secretary and one (1) National Treasurer to serve until he/she resigns, is unable to act, or is removed by action of the National Convention for failure to duly perform his/her duties as specified in Article X Duties of Officers sections 3 and 4 respectively. (Currently there are no term limits on elected National Officers. These limits mirror the Navy SVA limits for these offices.)

Article X Election and Duties Section 5 NEW By-Law

Installation of Officers. National Officers shall be installed at the end of the Annual National Convention meeting. Transfer of duties from prior National Officers to newly elected National Officers shall occur at the Annual Post

Convention Meeting. (There is currently no time table for installation of

National Officers following election.)

Election of officers will be held at the National Convention in 2017. All offices are open for election. Think about it. Would you like to help form a bigger and better NSVAA?

"WE BUILD WE FIGHT"

"WE BUILD, WE FIGHT" was created in celebration of the 75th Anniversary of the U.S. Navy Seabees occurring 5 March, 2017.

Seabees – their simple motto tells their story: "We build, We fight." For 75 years the Seabees have demonstrated their skills as builders and fighters. From the islands of the Pacific, to the jungles of Vietnam, to the mountains of Bosnia, and to the sands of the Mideast; they have built and fought around the globe for freedom through the years to preserve our liberties abroad and at home. In peacetime, they have been goodwill ambassadors, sharing American values across the world. In peace and in war, they have lived their slogan: "Can Do!"

This limited edition print is a montage of the Seabee experience over the past 75 years. The intent of the painting is to show how the mission of the Seabees remained steadfast throughout their history despite changes in where

they work, the tools of their trade, and the ever-changing world. Using photographs housed at the U.S. Navy Seabee Museum in Port Hueneme, California, the artist has created a background that spans the history of the Seabees, morphing from a scene of airfield construction on one of the Pacific islands during World War II on the left to one of airfield construction in current day combat operations on the right. The figures featured in the center of the portrait depict how the Seabees themselves have changed over the years both with respect to diversity and the uniform they wore. On the far left is a Civil Engineer Corps officer in khaki's reviewing a set of construction drawings standing next to a barechested enlisted Seabee in dungarees from World War II. In the center stands a Vietnam-era Seabee wearing the classic green utilities, a soft cover, and a flak jacket. Crouched in front are a Cold War-era Seabee Chief Petty Officer in woodland camouflage uniform and a Seabee diver wearing the green digital camouflage uniform, as well as a current Seabee in digital camouflage standing behind him wearing a hard hat. On the far right a female Seabee wears the original three color desert uniform. All are focused and ready to accomplish their mission. Seabees Can Do.

The original oil painting by James Dietz will be dedicated to all Seabees past, present, and future during the 75th Anniversary celebrations and will be permanently on display at the Seabee Museum in Pt. Hueneme, California.
